Frequently asked questions – Youth Voice Summit 16th May

Who is the event for?

This event is for secondary school / college students aged 11-18 to be accompanied by one member of staff. We are asking schools to bring a group of between 3 and 10 student representatives from across year groups who can contribute to discussions on discrimination – possibly including representatives from your student council. When you receive your booking form please indicate how many students you would *ideally* like to bring with you. We will confirm the number of places you have 6 weeks prior to the event.

Why is Leeds City Council holding this event?

LCC deliver the local UK Youth Parliament (UKYP) programme. We have 4 Members of Youth Parliament (MYPs). Each November, 350 MYP's from across the UK go to the <u>House of Commons</u> to vote for a campaign—for 2016 this is <u>"Tackling racial and religious discrimination"</u>.

Leeds City Council is holding this event to bring together students from across the city with key influencers and decision makers to progress the UKYP campaign by creating a platform to help reduce discrimination in all its forms both within your schools and local communities.

Where is the summit being held?

The venue is the prestigious Banqueting Suite of <u>Leeds Civic Hall</u>, Portland Crescent, LS1 (overlooking Millennium Square). It's a 0930 arrival for 10am start and 1415 finish.

What are the learning outcomes and curriculum links for this event?

- Students will work with senior leaders and elected members from Leeds City Council and partner
 organisations (see above) to explore the benefits of developing a student-led anti-discrimination
 policy for your school that will help address the PREVENT Duty for schools (July 2015)
- Students will engage in workshops with a leading national organisation Stop Hate UK to learn about different forms of discrimination and how to tackle it in your school and community.

- Students will learn about local youth democracy and how *their views* can shape local and national government priorities. This will help your school meet its duties under "Promoting British Values as part of SMSC".
- All students attending will have the opportunity to join the Leeds Youth Council and get involved in the work of Youth Parliament

Which students should we bring?

We are flexible in terms of the cohort of students you bring with you but as the focus of the summit is "discrimination" we would suggest you bring students who can actively engage in discussions around this issue. We would also ask you to consider identifying students from different year groups, students with a demographic mix that represents your student community and possibly some representation from your student council / leadership team if you have one.

What is the agenda for the day?
